Looking Forward to Welcoming Rev. Elizabeth B. Johnson Our New Associate Pastor for Congregational Evangelism and Engagement



On Sunday, August 20, the Associate Pastor Nominating Committee presented its report on a call for our Associate Pastor for Congregational Evangelism and Engagement. At the Congregational meeting, Rev. Elizabeth B. Johnson was unanimously elected by the congregation.

Elizabeth is a native of Greensboro, NC. She is married to David, a minister in the United Church of Christ. They are parents to McClaren, a therapist in Cary, NC, and Stafford, a sound engineer for a Chicago law office. Ready to experience with them the joys of life in South Carolina are their rescue pup, Loiza, and two feline friends, Buster and Mr. Squeakers.

Elizabeth was ordained in the PC(USA) in 2019 and was loaned to the Vero Beach church, a United Church of

Christ church, serving as Minister for Family and Community Life. There she served the church and community in various facets. She worked with families to deepen their faith, develop spiritual practices at home, and discover inter-generational fellowship opportunities within the congregation. She coordinated events and activities with the Sunday School Director and led a chapel for the Community Preschool children. Elizabeth taught a weekly Women's Bible Study and shared in the worship life of the church, as well as congregational care, including overseeing the Prayer Ministry, Caring and Sharing Group, and Healing After Loss Group. She organized Women's Retreats and Family Retreats, officiated funeral and memorial services, and weddings. Elizabeth also served on the Treasure Coast Interfaith Council and the Vero Beach Be Kind Board, working in her community to build connections and relationships with those seeking to make the world a better place for all of God's children.

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It's the beginning of a new church year!

Each fall, we celebrate reuniting after a summer that for some is comprised of travel, visiting with family and friends, or maybe enjoying some "down time," doing some of your favorite things. At First Presbyterian Church we are excited that adult Sunday School classes have begun; there is a new worship-sermon series based on the Book of Luke; the Sanctuary Choir has returned to Thursday night rehearsals and AiM Youth Choir is rehearsing on Thursdays; the Youth Group has kicked off; FPC Kids on Wednesdays has started; adult classes and small groups are meeting again throughout the week, and much, much more!

Here are several highlights—of an upcoming fellowship event and two adult classes.

- **Daufuskie Tastes and Tales**: On Wednesday, September 20, Breaking Bread of Congregational Life Ministry will host a Gullah-inspired dinner followed by speaker Jim Alberto, author of *Daufuskie Daze, Living & Teaching on a South Carolina Sea Island*.
- Luke & Acts Bible Study: This class, which begins on September 25, will be taught by member Jim Wagner. "Decades after Jesus' death, it seems that 'most excellent Theophilus' wants some answers. Is Jesus truly the Messiah? If so, why did he suffer and die?" The class will explore the largest contribution to the New Testament written by a single author. - Pastor Study with Rev. Will Robinson: Beginning on October 12, the four-week study will explore a "Letter from Birmingham Jail," a work by Dr. Martin Luther King. Learn more about the class by visiting the website.

"Caring Connections"

Those who welcomed the message about Jesus were baptized, and that day about three thousand persons were added. They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. Awe came upon everyone because many wonders and signs were being done through the apostles. All who believed were together and had all things in common. — Acts 2:41-44



Like our other four Values of Ministry—see the back cover of this issue—"Caring Connections" is based on the Scripture above, particularly "fellowship." In a congregation of our size (1,250+) that is "purple" (i.e., a mix of "red state" and "blue state" folks and those more

theologically progressive and more theologically conservative), fostering caring connections can sometimes be difficult. Indeed, these words in our worship bulletins say it well: "God knows we don't think alike" here!

We're united, though, by our faith in the Lord and our commitment to live that faith, including our Values. A crucial aspect of "Caring Connections" is a willingness to "accept one another" (in the lyrics of a hymn), especially given our differences, and to welcome and love one another as our Lord commands. We should do that in worship too. That's why we're using "Your/s" in the Lord's Prayer. Like the use of "sins," "Your/s" is contemporary language that's more welcoming and accessible to worshipers (in person and online) who aren't familiar with this prayer. Of course, you may still use "Thy/ Thine."

The use of screens in 10:30 AM worship is another

example. We began using them instead of the hymnals during the pandemic (because there was a time when it was thought that doing so would help prevent the spread of COVID-19). In the process, we learned that some worshipers—such as those with Parkinsonism and macular degeneration—appreciate the screens. At the same time, we limit their use at 10:30 AM (only for what the congregation says or sings and less than at our 9:00 AM CrossRoads contemporary service).

We also live our Value of "Caring Connections" by accepting how others express joy and gratitude in worship. Some do that with just a smile and sigh (or the like). It's expressed more internally. Others do that by applauding. They're not applauding a performance; they're expressing their joy and gratitude to God for what they've experienced. Again, particularly in a congregation of our size and composition, may we recognize and accept these varying expressions of joy and gratitude in worship.

I hope this issue of *First Press* opens the door to other possibilities of how we might cultivate "Caring Connections" here. As it does, I pray we will become that much more connected to the Lord and to one another.

News from the Visual Arts Ministry



In January, the Visual Arts Ministry will install a new exhibit from the Bowden collection, *Fill the Earth With Music*. "This installation includes 25 pieces from six centuries and many countries," says ministry chair Nancy Millette. "The hope is that the observer will appreciate how artists find inspiration in music, and each viewer will be further inspired to celebrate and Fill the Earth With Music."

Singing and musical instruments have been vital components in the life of the believing community as far back in the Bible (Genesis 4:21) as Jubal who played

the *kinnor* or harp. King David wrote many psalms, one of which is Psalm 150, and it charges us to praise the Lord with the trumpet, cymbals, stringed instruments, and organs. An engraving in this show has drawings of many biblical instruments.

The ministry shares that next spring they will sponsor an FPC member show entitled *STUDIO 540—Lifting Our Spirits With Our Gifts.* "We are fortunate to have many talented artists among our congregation," says Millette. "It's going to be exciting to see the variety of artistic contributions." More information to be announced in the next few months.

As we lift up caring connections in this issue of our newsletter, I'm grateful to see firsthand the work of our deacons and all the many ministries they oversee: lay visitation, our health ministry, our prayer chain and prayer project (which concluded at the end of the August); our knitters; the folks who make meals for Family Promise, our memorial receptions teams which share delicious food and compassion during times of grief, and many others. These ministries, and each of you who participate in them, share the love of Christ with those who are hurting, alone, on the margins. I also hear from many of you that by your participation, you "receive more than you give" as love and grace are returned to you by those with whom you connect.

As a society we are conditioned to "go it alone," to not ask for help, to keep things "private" lest we

appear weak or needy. That's such a shame because that isn't what Jesus taught. In scripture we find people boldly asking for help and healing, seeking restoration into community, reaching out to clutch the hem of Christ's cloak in their desire to find wholeness and inclusion. And in return, Jesus commends them for their faith and persistence, and asked his disciples to "feed my sheep" after he left this earth. Caring connections, one of our values here at FPC, reminds us that we



are called to be counter-culture because "community is part of God's plan and intention for us."

I'm excited by two new initiatives on the horizon. First, our Stephen Ministry, which launches in September with nine newly trained Stephen Ministers and four Stephen Leaders who will be commissioned in worship on October 8. Second, our Neighborhood Care Groups, which require no special training, just a willingness to step beyond our own front doors to "love our neighbors" who are FPC members while also making space for neighbors without a church home to be welcomed in. Watch for more details on both these ministries coming soon.


