FPC Children's Choir will sing during the 9 AM CrossRoads service on April 2 and at the 10:30 AM service the Sanctuary Choir—accompanied by the Chamber Orchestra—will present the cantata, *Our Father: A Musical Journey Through the Lord's Prayer*.

To prepare for Palm Sunday, the children have been rehearsing on Wednesday nights with Beth Green, Director of the Children's Choir.

The cantata was composed in 2014 by Pepper Choplin who described his inspiration for the composition, "I felt a strong calling to do this work. As I have spent many hours setting this timeless text, I have been continuously struck by its profound power."

This choral presentation is an extension of the Lenten allchurch study and worship-sermon series focused on the book, *The Only Prayer You'll Ever Need*, by Doug Fletcher, PhD, and First Presbyterian Church Senior Pastor/Head of Staff 2008-2019.

"The Last Word"



We're on the journey of Lent, a forty-day period of repentance and recommitment that helps prepare us to commemorate our Lord's death and resurrection. We'll soon enter the last week of Lent—Holy Week (see cover). Holy Week begins with shouts of "Hosanna!" on Palm

Sunday and ends with shouts of "Crucify him!" on Good Friday. As Christians, we commit to worship during Holy Week to experience anew and profoundly a "love so amazing, so divine [it] demands my soul, my life, my all."

We also *know* Holy Week in our own lives. Betrayal, suffering and loss. Unbearable pain. When the tears don't stop. When there's no end in sight or no light at the end of the tunnel. Maybe it's chronic pain. Or addiction. Or depression or dementia. Or the war, violence and injustices we see. Or maybe it's the death of a child, spouse or other loved one. At times, like Christ on the cross, we've cried: "My God, my God, *why*?! *Why*?" Yes, we *know* Good Friday in our own lives.

Thanks be to God the agony of Good Friday is *not* the end of the story. Easter is. Easter gives us hope that

suffering, loss and grief don't have the last word. That pain, war and injustice don't have the last word. That sin, evil and the grave don't have the last word. That's why the pews are packed on Easter Sunday. To hear again the Good News that "we don't grieve as those who have no hope." That "grief and crying and pain will be no more." That God is with us and that life and love have the last word.

Did you know Winston Churchill planned his own funeral? At the end of it, a single trumpeter, standing at the west end of St. Paul's Cathedral, played "Taps." Facing in the direction of the setting sun, he played it to signal the close of Churchill's days on earth. Then, another trumpeter, standing at the east end of St. Paul's, played "Reveille." Facing in the direction of the rising sun, he played it to signal the beginning of Churchill's new day in heaven.

Because Christ rose and lives, we believe that we have a new life now and that we will rise to eternal life one day. Yes, we believe the last song we'll hear, the last word, is not "Taps" but "Reveille."

You're Invited to Be a Stephen Minister!

Stephen Ministers are lay congregation members who are specially trained to provide confidential, one-to-one care to individuals who are experiencing difficulties in their lives and need a listening ear and a caring heart.

A Stephen Minister is not expected to be a therapist or pastor. A Stephen Minister is someone who will "be there" for his or her care receiver, meeting faithfully for about an hour each week, for as long as there's a need. Might you have the gifts and passion to become a Stephen Minister?



Training begins April 18 and will be held on Tuesdays from 1-3 PM through the end of June. (We will also have a few Saturday sessions). We will meet at Church of the Cross in downtown Bluffton and be joined by trainees from other churches: Providence, St. Andrew by the Sea, Church of the Cross, Beaufort Baptist and more. The church is helping defray the cost of training materials so they will be only \$25 per person (payable by cash or check to FPCHHI, note Stephen Ministry in the memo line).

The training includes a mixture of lecture, video, group discussion, skill practice, spiritual growth activities and fun. Topics include the art of listening, Christian caring and prayer, confidentiality, assertiveness, boundaries, how to begin and end a caring relationship, depression, grief and loss, ministering to the dying, job loss and divorce.

After your training, Stephen Ministers participate in twice-monthly continuing education to help them grow as Christians and as caregivers (these meetings will be held at FPC on Mondays from 1-3 PM).


